

Adequate Yearly Progress

Adequate Yearly Progress is part of the federal No Child Left Behind (NCLB) legislation. NCLB requires states to set student achievement target goals for all public schools. Under NCLB, Adequate Yearly Progress is used to report student participation and performance on the state's CSAP and CSAP alternative reading and math tests to determine if schools meet up to 54 targets for various subgroups (e.g., students with disabilities, English language learners, racial/ethnic groups, etc.).

Schools are rated either as “meeting AYP” (100% of targets met) or “not meeting AYP” (less than 100% of targets met). By the 2013-2014 school year, NCLB requires all students in Colorado to be proficient on reading and math state assessments. The performance targets increased in 2008, as they do every three years, so that by 2014 the target will be 100 percent of students scoring proficient.
